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MRHS hosts provincials: 2009

In May 2009, Musquodoboit Rural High School, MRHS, will host its first provincial table tennis championship.

In previous years, the gym has been too small to hold the requisite number of tables for a tournament. Provincial requirements state: there must be between 10 and 12 tables. In anticipation of this event, MRHS has acquired six new tables of very high quality from a national tournament in Halifax.

Players will compete in under-19, under-16, and under-14 categories. MRHS has, historically, had an excellent team, and coach Joe Fisher expects them to qualify for the provincial tournament. The boys' team has won the provincial title the past five years, with teammates Steven Hines and Stephen Trenaman, Kyle Coles and Tyler Ashley. All those players, however, graduated this past June.

Fisher, currently, is focussing his attention on the junior players. Now that table tennis has been introduced in the elementary schools as part of their gym class, younger kids are getting interested. There are also several clubs in communities where anyone can come and play.

The junior girls' team is also beginning to gather momentum. They presented their 2008 regional banner to the community at Awards Night this past June and, are expected to continue on to bigger and better things. Traditionally, there hasn't been much interest in the sport from girls, but that is beginning to change.

Fisher, one of six community coaches (a group which includes two MRHS teachers) has extensive experience in table tennis. While you didn't see him personally in Beijing this August, you might see his handiwork. Having already worked as an Olympic umpire himself at the Olympics in 1992, he has now turned his attention to evaluating umpires for the Olympics. He's also overseeing the development of future MRHS players personally, as he is the principal at Dutch Settlement Elementary School.

Streatch seeks re-election

Steve Streatch recently announced that he will be seeking a third term as Halifax Regional Councillor for District 1, Eastern Shore-Musquodoboit Valley.

He was first elected in a by-election in 1999. Since, Councillor Streatch maintained his seat in 2000 and 2004. He has been a lifelong resident of the Musquodoboit Valley where he now lives with his wife, Marilyn. They have five sons and one granddaughter.

Water systems update

As a result of the water system contamination and subsequent deaths in Walkerton, Ontario, in 2002 the Province of Nova Scotia introduced the Surface Water Treatment Standard, which required water treatment facilities in the province to achieve a new standard of treatment. In the late-eighties, when the existing facility at Middle Musquodoboit was built, it was designed with appropriate technology at the time.

Although the existing facility generally operates trouble free and produces good quality water, it does not meet the new requirements outlined by the treatment standard.

To meet the requirements of the standard, the existing treatment facility needs to be replaced. The new facility will use membrane water treatment technology, which provides an absolute physical barrier to pathogens in the water. Water will then be disinfected using a combination of ultraviolet light followed by liquid chlorine (also known as bleach or sodium hypochlorite). The proposed work at the site will include an addition to the existing building to house the new treatment equipment. Once the new facility is online, the existing equipment will be shut down and removed. Membranes are modular in nature and the designers have provided space in the design that will allow expansion of the facility if demand warrants it. The current system serves approximately 90 customers. This project will have a positive impact on Middle Musquodoboit because the residents will receive a reliable supply of high quality safe drinking water for years to come.

At a cost of nearly \$2 million the project will be funded equally by the three levels of government, each contributing approximately \$650,000. Without this funding partnership the cost of these upgrades would have been a burden too heavy for local residents to bear. I personally want to thank the provincial and federal governments for helping HRM and our community.

Community history

This month, The TownCryer is featuring the community history of Cook's Brook. The complete collection of community histories is available at the Visitor Information Centre, Middle Musquodoboit.

In early days, the settlers of Cook's Brook, as in surrounding areas, traveled by foot or went on horseback to the nearest stores at Halifax or Truro for supplies which they could not make or produce themselves. Butter, eggs, wool, meat, wood and soap were available at home. But, essentials such as flour, tea, sugar, molasses, nails, cotton, ammunition, cooking utensils, etc. had to be bought and taken home by sleigh or on horseback.

In later years, there were two stores in Cook's Brook. One was owned by George Newman and was situated at the mouth of the Newman Road, leading to Lake Egmont. The second store was owned by James McGeorge and was situated behind the present store (in 1982). It was later taken over by his son, William, who ran it until he had a new house with an adjoining store built in the early 1900s in front of the old building. The carpenter was John Cleary from Lake Egmont. William lived alone here and operated a general store for many years, using the older store as a storage place for kerosene oil, etc.

In December, 1941, Ian and Bertha MacDonald moved in the McGeorge house. And, in 1942, they began running the store as a branch of the Musquodoboit store. It went out of business as a Co-Op store on Nov. 19, 1947.

From then on, it was operated by Ian MacDonald himself who had a storage shed added to the end of the store and gas tanks put in front of it. Eventually, the store was sold to Vincent and Jennie Dillman who took over in 1976. The house and store were then remodeled, pavement put around the yard, gas tanks replaced with more modern ones, and a public washroom installed.

The establishment was bought and taken over by Ronald and Betty Carrol in May, 1981...

A small newspaper called the Cook's Brook Gazette was prepared by the Young People's Society on the happenings in the community the winter of 1942. The material was edited by Ruth (Isenor) MacDonald and typed by Rev. D.I. MacIntosh, and a copy sent to each of the Cook's Brook boys overseas. A copy of this is still in existence today.
